

With nine fortune 500 and thirteen Fortune 1000 companies located in the Cincinnati-Dayton Region and an estimated 3.1 million people living within 50 miles of Butler County, Southwest Ohio is a natural hub for road, water, air, and rail transportation!

Highways

- Butler County owns a network of interstate highways and major state routes, including I-75, I-71, I-275, I-70 and I-74.
- There are six major interchanges to I-75 alone.
- Butler County Veteran's Highway (SR.129) is a 25 mile, limited access east-west highway ending at the Indiana border in the west and I-75 in the east.

Trucking

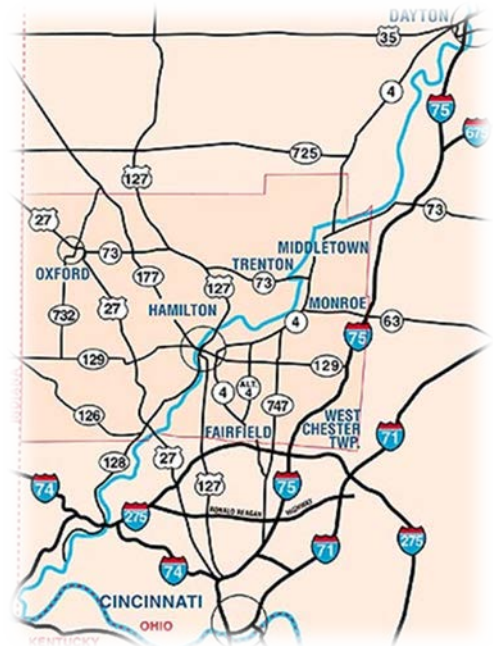
- Nine trucking firms have terminals in Southwest Ohio near I-75.
- More than 25 freight transport companies have roots in the greater Cincinnati area and over 900 interstate common motor freight carriers serve the region.

Water

- The Ohio River System contains 2,800 miles of navigable waterways.
- The river flows from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania to Cairo, Illinois at the intersection of the Mississippi River.
- Butler County's interstate highway system along with the accessible railroad systems provide convenient access to the Ohio River and Great Lake ports.

Rail

- Butler County is served by CSX Transportation, Norfolk Southern, and Conrail.
- These establishments provide rail service to all major cities and ports throughout Ohio, the Midwest, and the East Coast.
- The CSX Queensgate Computerized Railyard is one of the largest and most efficient facilities in North America.

Surrounding Air Service

- The Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport (CVG) offers nonstop service to over 60 destinations, including areas such as Paris and Toronto.
 - CVG served more than 8.9 million passengers in 2018 with an average of 180-190 daily departures.
 - Highest-ranked U.S. airport in the 2017 Skytrax World's Best Airport awards.
 - Last year, CVG was rated 4th for total cargo operations in North America, making it the fastest growing cargo airport in the nation.
- The Dayton International Airport (DAY) serves both air and ground markets
 - DAY is located at the intersection of I-70 and I-75.



Butler County Air Service

- Butler County regional airport is conveniently located in south central Butler County, minutes from Hamilton, Fairfield, West Chester, and I-75.
 - The airport has over 5,500 of runway used commonly by business jets and most other types of general aircrafts and is home to one of University of Cincinnati's Air Care Medical Aircrafts
- Miami University Airport is located in the Oxford area.
 - Though it is primarily used for flight training for university students, the airport is also available for landing planes and small jets
